

Teach English in Thailand



COURSE FORMAT

The TEFL course is 120 hours in over a 4 week training period. You will be in class Monday to Friday, from around 9:00 am to 16:00 pm. Teaching practices are organised after your usual day's training, on selected days.



TEACHING PRACTICES

You'll complete 6 teaching practicals, with real Thai students. The ages will range and class sizes also. You'll also learn from observations of your peers. When sessions are done, verbal and written feedback is provided by the course trainer.



TYPE OF ASSESSMENT

You will be constantly observed and assessed throughout the course. There are projects, reports and journals to be submitted, all forming your overall assessment.



COURSE LOCATION AND CENTRE

The TEFL training center is located in north Bangkok between the home campus of Kasetsart University—Thailand's third oldest and now largest university with some 67,000 students—and the world's only "Elephant Building", a thirty-two story tower that floats over the area.



REQUIREMENTS

To do the TEFL course need to be at least 18 years old (although each case is considered on a case by case basis. You can also be a non-native speaker of English as long as you have a level C1 or above, which will be tested during the interview. In order to work in a school or language centre in Thailand, you need to hold a Bachelors degree, in any discipline.



JOB MARKET AND EMPLOYMENT POSSIBILITY

There are hundreds of TEFL jobs throughout the country. You'll have full assistance in securing your TEFL role after training. The team will ensure your needs are met. Most jobs are in schools, ranging from kindergarten to high school. Occasionally there are summer camps and language centre positions, as well as online teaching opportunities.



VISA REQUIREMENTS

Visa information changes all the time. Most candidates enter on a pre-purchased tourist visa. Following the course and once you've secured your new job, you'll be guided through the process of applying for a work permit. WORK IN THAILAND

Most teaching jobs in Thailand are in public schools, with ages ranging from kindergarten, through to high school.

You can expect to work on the mainland, Monday to Friday, from around 8am to 4pm. You'll be teaching around 20 hours per week, and lesson planning and marking in your free periods.

Peak hiring season is May and November, as there are only 2 long terms in Thailand each year. There are jobs all year round in English camps, summer camps, language centres, and online teaching. A usual contract length begins around 5 months.

You can expect to earn 30,000 Thai Baht, per month as a minimum. Some schools do pay more, dependent on experience.
